





"Confessions of a Gay Priest" by Tom Rastrelli c.2020, University of Iowa Press \$19.95 / higher in Canada 328 pages



You spent days examining your life. Sins: that's what you were looking for How had you displeased God? How many lies, covets, dishonors? What have you done since – oh, when *was* your last confession, anyhow? They say the sacrament is good for your soul, and in **"Confessions of a Gay Priest" by Tom Rastrelli**, there's a lot to tell. Though he'd always known that he liked boys, little Tommy Rastrelli pretended the opposite when he was in gradeschool because

marriage was what good Catholics did. His family was devout and Rastrelli never questioned God's love. Not even after, he says, he was repeatedly molested by a doctor in his Iowa hometown.

For several reasons, he never told his parents about the abuse, enduring it for years until he'd convinced them that he was too old for a pediatrician. That God hadn't saved him from a predator made Rastrelli slowly lose his faith and his self-respect. He stopped attending Mass and began questioning the Church's teachings.

But then God called a shocked Tom Rastrelli to the priesthood. It happened while he was at college, and the whole idea quickly consumed him. Gone was the plan to major in theatre; instead, Rastrelli began to explore a world steeped in mystery and ritual, but overlaid with fear. Always believing that testimony against the doctor could save others from the same abuse, Rastrelli took legal action, knowing that scandal could ruin his chance to attend seminary.

There were many things undiscussable, in fact, and the court case was only half of it. As he progressed in his journey to ordination, the secrets included priestly kisses, caresses, and soft lies that a "backrub" was just a backrub. At nearly every gathering, Rastrelli was approached for sex or touched inappropriately, led to believe that celibacy had wiggle-room, plied with alcohol or favors, and left to deal with it alone. He fell in misguided love.

And then he fell into a deep depression, with only one real way out... "The Confessions of a Gay Priest" is a hard, hard book to read – it'll make you squirm, it'll make your eyebrows raise, you'll want to toss it on the street and let semis run it over and yet, it's stay-up-all-night compelling.

Beginning with his ordination (so you know-don't-know the end of the story), author Tom Rastrelli tells a tale that will further shock Catholics already reeling from church-related scandals. This book, however, is not written in the same manner as is a diocesan document: Rastrelli is sometimes extremely graphic, both in the bedroom and in his various emotional states. He doesn't pull back the curtains on his experiences, he rips them down and burns them. He used pseudonyms, but tells details before softening his harshness with beautiful language, strong faith, and poetic distractions that play with a reader's sympathy. You can't beat a book like that, though its graphic nature needs to again be underscored. For a reader who can endure a panoply of squirms, "Confessions of a Gay Priest" is worth deep examination.

Most of the apartments-- available in early 2021 -- are income-qualified, which means

there is a maximum amount of income you can have to live there.

The Art Lofts include one, two and three-bedroom apartments ranging in size from approximately 875 sq. ft. for a one-bedroom to about 1,200 sq. ft. for a three-bedroom apartment. All apartments are pet-friendly and come with a number of "built-in" amenities in addition to the beautiful historic atmosphere. There are 110 apartments available and 103 of them are income-qualified. The remaining seven apartments will be rented at the going market rate. Larger families also can live in the income-qualified apartments, with income limits based on family size. Numerous amenities will be available at the Art Lofts including: Modern open floorplans In-suite laundry Two community rooms Exciting new retailers, restaurants, coffee house and bars Fitness facility **Business** center Rotunda event space Health & wellness visits from Public Health staff and others

Rental parking in nearby garages available through the County

For older LGBT adults, it can be challenging to find a welcoming and affirming place to live in our later years so it's exciting to have an option like the Art Lofts in our beautiful newly renovated Arcade. If downtown living appeals to you, don't miss this opportunity to get your name on the list of potential residents because the appeal of the Arcade will likely cause these apartments to rent quickly.

Counselors are available via phone 24/7 to discuss your results with you.

ALL NEW: The Greater Dayton LGBT Center along with our partners at Equitas Health have announced FREE COVID-19 Testing. Tests are done by appointment only in our drive up testing area in front of our building at 24 N. Jefferson Street, Dayton, OH 45402. Don't drive, not a problem we are just one block from the bus hub and will have a tent availabe where testing may be done safely. Just visit our website at www.daytonLGBTcenter.org for information on how to set your appoinment. This testing is open to all, no matter if you have shown symptom prior. Dayton PRIDE 2020 ~ Rise Up

Due to this pandemic we have all seen many changes and sometime out right cancelations of many events, PRIDE is no-exception. After much consideration and planning, we have decided to cancel the Friday night "Affair on the Square" and subsequent Bar Crawl previously scheduled for August 21st.

On Saturday August 22nd we plan a very different PRIDE & Pride Parade in that we are planning a "*Parade in Reverse.*" This means, we will ask exhibitors and usual groups that typically participate in the parade to set up banners and displays along Second Street to present to spectators. We ask any would be spectators to participate by decorating their own vehicles and simply driving down 2nd street between Patterson and Main Streets much like an *old fashion Cruse-In* to show your pride and view the displays.



The Pride parade typically ends at Courthouse Square with a community festival. This year due to safety concerns we will not hold the festival in person. We are planning celebration online! At 1 pm we will begin a live broadcast of PRIDE to 3 pm with special guest, local entertainers, and live musicians. So kick back with your favorite beverage and tune in from 1-3 pm via spectrum Channel 5, Face-Book Live, or YouTube Live. We will return to Courthouse Square June 4th & 5th of 2021.

While we have canceled our 5th Annual Spikes & Heels KickBall Tournament for 2020 it will return next year. We are pleased PFLAG has announced they will proceed with the 5th Annual Pride Run Walk on August 23rd.

1. Masks, gloves, and hand sanitizer will be provided for everyone who wants them. Volunteers will all be wearing masks and gloves.


2. Starting times for the race will be staggered so social distancing can be observed.
