


# Book Reviews

"The Heart: Frida Kahlo in Paris" by Marc Petitjean, translated by Adriana Hunter c.2020, Other Press \$25.00 / \$34.00 Canada 208 pages



Every brush stroke must have had mean-

ing.

Every color, every shading, every wipe and fingerprint and trowelmark left by the artist became a portrait of metaphor and mystery: what was the artist trying to say? Was it just a painting or, as in "The Heart" by Marc Petitjean, was there a story behind it for observers to unravel?

Because his father had led a colorful life, Marc Petitjean was surrounded by artwork and objets d'art for most of his childhood. One of those works was a painting that Petitjean understood was important to his father. Later, long after the elder man died, Petitjean

learned how important the painting was when a stranger inquired about his father, and the affair he had with Frida Kahlo.

Michel Petitjean was just twenty-nine when he met Kahlo; she was thirty-three, and was staying in France at the time, having gone there because André Breton, who'd founded the surrealist movement, had decided on his own that Kahlo was a surrealist painter. Breton told her that he wanted to do an exhibit of her work but when Kahlo arrived in France, she was angered that Breton was unprepared for both her arrival and her show. She'd met Breton when he and his wife, Jacqueline, came to Mexico to talk with Leon Trotsky, who was living temporarily with Kahlo and her husband, Diego Rivera. The Bretons stayed the Rivera's for several months – long enough for Kahlo to have a brief but playful sexual affair with Jacqueline before the Bretons returned to France.

Petitjean says that there is no way to know exactly how his father met Kahlo, but the first time they slept together "was the day Barcelona fell."

They didn't speak the same language but he comforted her as best he could, and she grew to mean a lot to him. Later, he helped her pack up her paintings to return them to Mexico, and she gave him option of choosing any painting he wanted.

He chose *The Heart*.

In a surprisingly charming mixture of fact and fiction, author Marc Petitjean spins a dreamy tale of an artist and a painting that is in itself a mystery. That, the multiple hypotheses, and a lingering unknown make "The Heart" a captivating tale.

Petitjean depicts Paris in the pre-War years in a way that lets readers feel the devil-may-care extravagance of the city's residents living in the shadow of Nazism and looming trouble, giving this book a dark sense of forboding. He then imagines Kahlo's political leanings and adds to her mystique, giving her a certain cheeky flamboyance and, with passages that seem as if they're viewed through sheer white curtains, he shows us a Kahlo that falls easily in lust and love, but with a blithe sense of detatchment.

Petitjean hints that his father was more upset about that than was Kahlo, but again – we'll never know for sure. Still, readers that love art, biographies, historical mysteries, and Kahlo in particular will find "The Heart" to be a stroke of enjoyment.

We will begin on Friday August 21st with an "Affair on the Square" with food trucks, beer and live entertaiment featuring the Ohio Brass and Electric Group and the "Rubi Girls." Following the evening entertainment you may enjoy the .5k Bar Crawl.



On Saturday August 22nd we begin the day with a healthy breakfast at the Annual Pride Breakfast served up at MJ's on Jefferson Street. With a \$5.00 suggested donation you may start your day off right.



At 11 am we will line up for the PRIDE Parade in Cooper Park at the Corner of 2nd and St. Clair Streets. At 12 noon the parade will step off turning left from St. Clair Street straight down 2nd street to Main Street where the parade will turn left to Court—house Square. (Yes, this is a

new parade route for 2020 only due to the construction that will be takeing place on Jefferson Street.) As the Parade arrives at Courthouse Square the awaiting crowd will welcome them to kick off the Pride Festival with live enterainment until 4 pm. At 8 pm the Dayton Gay Men's Chorus will present their PRIDE concert with more details on this to come.

On Sunday August 23rd PFLAG Dayton presents the 5th Annual Running with Pride 5K Run/Walk. at 9 am. Registrantion is available now at pflagdayton.org. At Noon we also begin our 5th Annual Spikes & Heels kickball tournament at Burns Jackson Park in Dayton.

#### The Greater Dayton LGBT Center Re-Opens

In consideration of you and your loved ones safety, the Center has remained closed during the Month of May and will make preprations for a soft re-opening around the first of June. This of course, is to lesson the spread of the COVID-19 virus. When we do open there will be some healthy protocals in place to help protect everyone such as a mask requirement when visiting or attending a group. If you do not have a mask, one will be provided and even gloves are recomended. We take your health and well beaing very seriously.

#### **COVID Health Survey**



Amidst the COVID-19 pandemic, the collection of demographic data on LGBTQ people diagnosed with or deceased due to COVID-19 is very important. Most official death certificates and some healthcare records do not capture sexual orientation or full gender identity data, which makes it almost impossible to know how

the pandemic is affecting the health and lives of LGBTQ people. Public Health - Dayton & Montgomery County would like your help to gather data about LGBTQ people in the Miami Valley who have been diagnosed with and/or died due to COVID-19. This could be information about yourself if you identify as LGBTQ and were officially diagnosed with COVID-19 by a healthcare provider, or if you had a positive COVID antibody test. You also can complete the survey for/about an LGBTQ person whose death you can confidently and accurately identify as related to or caused by COVID-19.

Please complete this quick survey to help document COVID-19 LGBTQ cases and deaths. Any information you submit will be sent securely and directly to Public Health and will be secure in compliance with healthcare confidentiality regulations. We recognize that this survey process is not the perfect solution to identifying LGBTQ people affected by COVID-19, but it is the best stop-gap method currently available for us to gather data.
